ANALYSIS OF THE ECONOMIC RELATIONS BETWEEN SPAIN AND THE UNITED STATES

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The main objective of this course is for students to acquire a real perspective of the nature and possibilities of the economic relations between the US and Spain.

The course is divided into two parts; first, from a comparative perspective we will study the characteristics and structures of both economies. Second, we will analyze the past, present and future of the bilateral economic relations.

OBJECTIVES

This course is centered in the student and it is based in the acquisition of different competences. These are:

Competence1.	Know and understand the main structural and conjunctural characteristics of the Spanish and the American economy.
Competence 2.	Develop the ability to analyse the past and the present of the bilateral relations, as well as to anticipate it in the short, medium and long term.
Competence 3.	Identify the main characteristics of the institutional framework under which the bilateral relationship takes place. Understand the strategies used by both countries for their exports, imports, investments, main economic sectors, as well as the channels and distribution strategies used by both countries.
Competence4.	Use different research methods to collect important data: bibliography, databases, and others.
Competence5.	Present and communicate the information acquired in a professional manner.

METHODOLOGY

Classes will be structured around the explanations given by the professor, written and audiovisual material.

Students will work individually and in groups in other to debate and understand different readings provided by the professor and to do regularly reports and presentations about different topics.

These will help students to show their competence of analysis. There will also be a mid-term and a final exam.

PREPARATION

Students should prepare for class, reading the assigned articles and reflecting on them so there can be a discussion in class about the topic chosen by the professor. Students should acquire the necessary vocabulary and ideas that will help them gain a good base for higher economic courses. The language of instruction is English and though most articles and materials will be provided in English there might be some in Spanish as well.

EVALUATION

Student participation (must be active, asking questions, making relevant comments, giving ideas and debating about the different topics presented in class). Student must read all the readings and do any assignments given by the professor. **This section is 15% of the final grade.**

Written reports (2). The objective of these is for the student to reflect on and analyze an aspect of the economic bilateral relationship.

Presentations (2). The objective of these is for the student to present his findings to the class and engage other students in a debate about a certain topic.

The written reports and the presentations could be about the same topic or different topics. They should be approved ahead of time by the professor. They could also be done individually or in groups.

This course includes different evaluation systems. Student's daily and continuous work will be considered as well as their attitude and interest towards the subject.
