INTRODUCTION TO SPAIN

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will cover various topics related to the exciting social, political, economic, historical and cultural challenges and developments in Spain. The course will serve as a well-rounded and intriguing introduction to Spain culture. In the last few decades Spanish society has undergone significant social and cultural changes to be considered in this course through looking at different texts and media, including film, music, dance, literature, art, monuments, museums and the like. As a result, narratives of ethnic and racial identities, narratives of immigration and postmodernism among others will also be studied.

This course will allow students to gain a critical awareness of narratives of cultural and political identities and issues affecting contemporary Spain. We will analyse and historically contextualize a variety of cultural media that deal with how identities are shaped and contested in contemporary Spain. The various topics analysed in this course will ultimately allow students to deepen their understanding of the issues that affect modern Spanish society.

NOTE: This course includes different cultural topics (such as bullfighting or nudity) that may hurt the student's sensibilities.

OBJECTIVES:

By the end of the course, students will have acquired the following competences:

Competence 1.	Ability to analyse and interpret texts and cultural practices through
	the acquisition of a broad knowledge of significant cultural texts
	(film, literature, music, dance, photography, cities and museums)
	produced in contemporary Spain, addressing the aesthetic and
	thematic concerns of these cultural texts.

Competence 2.	Development of linguistic ability in Spanish. The course expands our
	understanding of important issues related to the nation, race or
	gender, among others, which affect post-Franco Spanish society.
Competence 3.	Ability to express our individual and collective opinions.
Competence 4.	Develop an understanding of Spanish culture and an awareness and
	sensitivity to foreign cultures.
Competence 5.	Adopt a critical approach to the selection and organization of the
	material in order to present written and oral arguments in a coherent,
	structured manner and to contribute to group discussions in Spanish
	through intellectual stimulation.

METHODOLOGY

The theoretical-practical lessons will be mainly based on the information in the class manual and completed with autonomous study on behalf of the students. Moreover, there will be power point presentations and audiovisual material. During the course, there will be a brief research assignment on a book chosen by the instructor.

Finally, there will be 2 exams during the course, a mid-course exam and a final exam, in order to assess if the students have achieved the required competences at the end of the course. The aim is to work on theoretical content and to achieve the development of the previously mentioned skills.

PREPARATION

Students must come to each class fully prepared having read the relevant texts and completed the assigned exercises. Students' work at home is essential as it will allow each student to actively participate and develop a deeper understanding of the content. In most cases this individual preparation will consist of reading the assigned readings contained in the class manual and completing the comprehension and discussion questions.

EVALUATION

This course will be evaluated through a variety of different types of assignments in order to further the development of the target competencies and the students' individual abilities. Consequently, the global evaluation will be based on student in-class participation as well as the completion of the different individual and group assignments such as analytic critiques, research papers, oral presentations, and supplementary extracurricular activities. The following table shows the percentage adjudicated to each assignment:

I Participation: Active in-class participation is essential to this course. The student must not simply raise his/her questions in class but must individually and spontaneously provide comments and opinions in class discussions. Each student will prepare the readings before class in order to be able to contribute to the class debate. The professor will grade these in-class activities and may suggest research projects based on the themes and ideas raised in class. The percentage of this activity is **25%** of the total mark.

Il Research Project: Students will complete a research project and give an oral presentation about a film a text or any other source. The objective of this assignment is to analyze another work applying the historical analysis undertaken and developed in class to complement the themes studied. It will permit students to investigate in depth a topic or theme of interest to them. The total percentage of this activity is **40%**.

III A. Suggested Complementary Activities.

There will be complementary, extracurricular activities during the semester. Possibly:

- Visits to Toledo,
- Segovia etc.

These visits will occur outside of class

III B. Extra Credit

Should students have the opportunity to visit other cities or towns on their own time, they will have the opportunity to earn extra credit. Students can write an open reflection to describe their experiences and what they've learned about Spanish culture, customs and people, connecting it to what we've learned in class. What did you learn about the local place that relates to what you learned in class? What are the similarities/differences to your own town/culture? Does it differ from other places in Spain? The report should not exceed 5 pages in length.

Students can earn as much as **one percentage point** towards final grade. Students can do **up to three extra credit reports**. The extra-credit complementary activities reports are separate from the REQUIRED complementary extracurricular activities stated previously.

IV Final Exam: The final exam will be conducted at the end of the course.

PLAGIARISM: If the professor detects any copying or plagiarism on the exams, analytic critiques, and/or research paper and oral presentation the student will receive a total grade of zero (0) and will not be allowed to complete any type of make-up or extra credit work.

ATTENDANCE

Class attendance is MANDATORY. If the student is absent for more than the allowed limit (one class absence in the summer programs and two absences in the fall and spring programs), the final grade will reflect a decrease of 10 points for each non-attendance that has not been excused by a doctor's certificate or by your Program Director. It is the individual responsibility of the student to make up any missed content about the subject taught in class the day the student was absent.
