COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The course will survey the African Diaspora in general with a focus on the African Moors in Spain, the transatlantic and trans-Saharan slave trade and colonialization in the western hemisphere. Spain, Portugal and Jamaica will be a particular focus.

Students should leave this course with improved skills in critical thinking, analytical writing, as well as a greater appreciation of the historical background of contemporary issues.

In an effort to respond to a variety of learning styles, the course format includes: discussions, cooperative and collaborative learning, readings, primary source documents digital as well as museum visits, historical sites and excursions.

• Stanley Lane-Poole & Arthur Gilman, The Story of the Moors in Spain (Available electronically, but required selections provided in class/on Blackboard)

• Sue Peabody & Keila Grinberg, Slavery, Freedom & the Law in the Atlantic World (e-text \$7-\$14, paperback \$20). (Available electronically, but required selections provided in class/on Blackboard)

Assigned readings should be completed daily. Your textbooks serve as a foundation and primary source in studying the African Diaspora History. Students who finish their readings in a timely manner will have a greater understanding of the course content and can post effective responses to the discussion boards and complete the required assignments.

Give examples of historiographical interpretations.

Identify and discuss key people, groups and events in African Diaspora History.
